



Manuel Axel Strain

Known for their passionate work rooted in personal experience, artist Manuel Axel Strain embraces and exalts the Coast Salish longhouse to confront the oppressive, racist colonial context surrounding them. Titled $x^waniwan$ $ce:p\ k^w\theta a\theta$ naweyat ((((Remember your teachings)))), their major multi-media exhibition—including paintings, family photographs, video, and installation—promises to transform the Gallery with a dynamic mix of new and recent artworks rendered in their boldly unique style.

The shed-roof longhouses of Coast Salish peoples are central to community life. Built from planks of red cedar, these structures vary in scale, stretching up to several hundred feet in length. Capable of housing multiple and extended families, they serve as gathering places for culturally and spiritually significant events such as naming ceremonies, marriages, and potlatches. Before their attempted erasure by colonial powers, rows of these houses lined the coast. However, the vital cultural, relational, and

ceremonial structures and values the longhouse embodies continue to flourish today.

Of Musqueam, Simpcw, and Syilx descent, Strain celebrates the cedar longhouse not only as an enduring architectural form but also an important spiritual, philosophical, and cultural framework profoundly embedded with the sacred collectivist beliefs of their family members and communities—past, present, and future. At the same time, Strain encourages visitors to the Gallery to critically consider the structures—be they architectural, social, cultural, or otherwise—that are predominantly upheld in contemporary Canadian society. What colonialist and capitalist values are embedded in these structures? And what can we learn from the longhouse, not only as an architectural typology that continues to inspire contemporary Indigenous architects today, but as a dynamic model for living, working, and learning together?

In Mystical Whorl No. 3, Susan Point draws from her vast knowledge of Coast Salish beliefs, practices, and aesthetics in her celebration of the spindle whorl. She employs a combination of trigons, triangular forms that Point extends and curves to suggest the wings, horn, tail, and beak of the mythical thunderbird, as well as crescent shapes to imply the bird's face, claws, and the tips of its plumage. She skillfully juxtaposes positive and negative spaces of these shapes to create a silhouette of the bird, rather than simply drawing its literal form. The circular arrangement and elongation of shapes to form the thunderbird, a significant supernatural creature in Coast Salish cosmology, would create a mesmerizing image if applied to a spinning disc. In this print, Point's design evokes not only the whorl's metaphysical importance, but also its essential function as a spinning object.

A continual source of inspiration and focus for Point's extensive body of work, the spindle whorl is typically

crafted from the richly grained wood of maple or alder trees. It has long been a cherished tool of Coast Salish women for transforming wool from woolly dogs, and later sheep, into strands of yarn in order to weave clothing and blankets. The disc traditionally features a surface with carved decorative elements. A hole at its centre cradles the spindle rod, allowing the spinning process to occur. Through her homage to this tool throughout her oeuvre, Point not only celebrates Coast Salish culture but also makes visible the value of the creative contributions of Coast Salish women.

Susan Point, a widely acclaimed and prolific Musqueam artist has devoted a substantial opus dedicated to the humble spindle whorl, a tool associated with weaving, traditionally women's work. Using this powerful motif, she has created sculptures out of a wide range of materials, as well as prints on paper, which have been widely exhibited and collected. In 2006, Point was awarded Officer of the Order of Canada (OC) for her outstanding achievement and service to Canada.

Khim Mata Hipol Eroplanong Papel at Bangkang Papel

Aberdeen Station, Canada Line

Activating memories through movement, artist Khim Mata Hipol folds migrant rituals into *Eroplanong Papel at Bangkang Papel*, evoking the childhood innocence of paper airplanes and boats. The photograms, prismed through an origami of light and shadow, become a yantra for migration, where striking minimalism amplifies the vulnerability of new beginnings.

Mary Sui Yee Wong TREASURE II

Lansdowne Station, Canada Line

Mary Sui Yee Wong's TREASURE (1999) was originally a public art commission as part of Québec's Integration of Art and Architecture program, and currently sits in the foyer of a hospital located in Montréal's Chinatown. Wong intended for the installation to bring the atmosphere of a natural setting into the sterile interior space for the residents to enjoy. It consists of a four-panel mural depicting the sky bracketing a landscape drawing, while the Chinese character 宝 for "treasure"— rendered in glass—sits in a shallow basin of water below. TREASURE II (2025), a striking new iteration of the work, features a vivid blue sky and billowing clouds, which frame a black-and-white detail of the classical Chinese landscape painting Buddhist Temples amid Autumn Mountains.

Lauraine Mak Levels

Brighouse Station, Canada Line

Levels is an ongoing series of works centering around the concept of measurement as a means to justify and understand phenomena. These photos capture an uncertain moment in time grounded by a tiny bubble of air at the center of a precision bubble level. The instrument negotiates a version of truth with the observer which is contingent on gravity, orientation, and precise reading, thus rendering an indisputable analytical truth. Is objective positionality unquestionable? Are instruments of measurement infallible? The inconspicuous bubble level is a powerful tool that symbolizes the logical order imposed on daily life and motion; a reminder that all things follow earthly physics in one way or another.

Sofiya Mukhachova and Quinton Qiu Cosmos and Companionship

September 15, 2025 - January 4, 2026

Bringing together the works of Belarus-born artist Sofiya Mukhachova and Cantonese artist Quinton Qiu, this exhibition presents whimsical cosmic dreamscapes (with a companion pet) and intimate visual diaries. Through contrasting yet complementary approaches, Mukhachova's and Qiu's works illuminate both the intimate and infinite dimensions of being—from celestial meditations to





everyday affection. These two Richmond-based artists work invites us to enter their worlds, and to reflect on how the personal and the universal continually fold into one another.

Aspire Richmond Magnificent Kingdom


September 16 - November 10


