




The Chromophiliacs

January 24 – April 4

Curated by Zoë Chan

“Chromophobia”—the fear of colour—“manifests itself in the many and varied attempts to purge colour from culture, to devalue colour, to diminish its significance.” So explains David Batchelor in his book *Chromophobia* (2000). Historically marginalized and suppressed within Europe and North America, colour continues to be linked to notions of impurity, primitivism, and decadence.

This fear of colour within Euroamerican culture, art, and society reaches far beyond a simple preference of palette. In some manifestations of chromophobia, colour is belittled as merely decorative—existing in the realm of the exotic and the primitive, the frivolous and the feminine. In more extreme cases, colour is reviled as foreign and outright dangerous. As Batchelor argues: “As with all prejudices, its manifest form, its loathing, masks a fear: a fear of contamination and corruption by something that is unknown or appears unknowable.” His thesis continues to resonate today with the amplification of so-called “neutral” hues in fashion, architecture, and interior design on social media, and the rise of white supremacist movements rooted in xenophobic sentiment, where whiteness is equated with racial purity, to be protected at any cost.

At the opposite end of the spectrum are the artists showcased in *The Chromophiliacs*. Profoundly inspired by colour, their multifaceted practices are deeply rooted in a myriad of craft practices, global aesthetics, and cultural traditions, from Persian miniatures, Coast Salish ovoid forms, and Mesoamerican mythology, to hyperbolic crochet, tropical plein air painting, and African American memory jugs. Repudiating the seemingly eternal rationale of the “white cube,” artists Diyan Achjadi, Moozhan Ahmadzadegan, Maru Aponte, Sandeep Johal, Yaimel López Zaldívar, Laura Meza Orozco, Osvaldo Ramirez Castillo, Malina Sintnicolaas, Charlene Vickers, and Jan Wade transform Richmond Art Gallery’s walls with their complex engagement with colour.

Donated to Richmond Art Gallery by Arthur Richardson in 1994, this mosaic by Jalisco artist Juan Carrillo de la Cruz exemplifies the rich artistic tradition of the Huichol or Wixárika community in Northwestern Mexico.

For the Huichols, the realm of spirituality is intricately woven into the fabric of daily life, and their art is a vivid expression of this very present relationship with the cosmos. The imagery and colour palette in Huichol art brim with symbolism.


Mosaic #62 is square and compact, with an abstract depiction of the peyote cactus at its centre, rendered in intense hues of red, yellow, green, and orange. An integral part of the Huichol people's daily life, the peyote is considered sacred—"a bridge between worldly and supernatural knowledge," wrote curator Amir Ali Alibhai who presented works by Huichol artists in the exhibition *Art and Spirit I: Visions* (1994). Surrounding the peyote are multi-coloured stars, celestial objects that symbolize the spiritual universe to the Huichols. The deer also

holds a revered role in their pantheon of gods, alongside the sacred cactus.

The recurring use of brightly colored, high-contrast images against a dark background, arranged concentrically around the peyote, creates a kaleidoscopic effect that evokes cosmic experience. While these formal elements may explain aspects of the culture to outsiders, for the Huichol people, the colors reinforce their deep connection to the spiritual realm. Red, an intense and formidable hue, is often associated with the sacred peyote; black with life, the ocean, and the goddess Tatei Aramara, mother of the sea; purple with humanity and earthly existence; and blue with water, rain, and the god Rapawiyene.



Upcoming Exhibitions

I digress

April 18 – July 5

Curated by Zoë Chan

Representing a wide range of perspectives, this group exhibition will present artists who engage with both lived experiences and collective histories in their art practices. Some artists embrace an autobiographical or confessional vein, drawing from memoirs, diaries, and photo-albums, while others mine existing archives and ephemera found in the public realm, employing a more documentary approach.

Working across diverse media including photography, video, printmaking, embroidery, and collage, these artists bring into focus myriad memories and microhistories revolving around such varied topics as the intersection of class shame and diasporic experience; queer coming-of-age in conservative Alberta; the exploitation of Punjabi students and migrant workers in Canada; and fears and insecurities that undergird artistic life.

Artists include Simranpreet Anand, Jo-Anne Balcaen, August Klintberg, Anne Koizumi, and Gonzalo Reyes Rodriguez, among others.

SIDE CORE: under city

April 18 – July 5

Richmond Art Gallery presents the first North American exhibition of Japanese artist collective SIDE CORE. Known for site-specific projects that blur the boundaries between contemporary art, skate culture, and urban infrastructure, the Tokyo-based collective presents a selection of video works and photographs that explore the often-overlooked spaces of the city—from highways and railroads to drainage tunnels and underground waterways.

At the heart of the exhibition is *rode work ver. under city*, a multi-channel video installation. Created in collaboration with renowned skate film crew Far East Skate Network, the work captures skaters navigating Tokyo's subterranean environments—including stormwater basins, disused transit tunnels, and maintenance corridors. These movements transform utilitarian spaces into expressive terrains, linking isolated structures into a speculative, virtual undercity.

Like Richmond, much of Tokyo is built on reclaimed land, and faces the constant risk of natural disasters. *rode work ver. under city* was shot in a regulating reservoir constructed as part of the city's flood control system. Although Tokyo and Richmond are separated by the Pacific Ocean, they share geological conditions as well as cultural and historical connections. Through this project, *SIDE CORE: under city* seeks to reveal the invisible links that exist between such distant places.

Khim Mata Hipol

Eroplanong Papel at Bangkang Papel

Aberdeen Station, Canada Line

Activating memories through movement, artist Khim Mata Hipol folds migrant rituals into *Eroplanong Papel at Bangkang Papel*, evoking the childhood innocence of paper airplanes and boats. The photograms, prisms through an origami of light and shadow, become a yantra for migration, where striking minimalism amplifies the vulnerability of new beginnings.

TREASURE II

Lansdowne Station, Canada Line

Mary Sui Yee Wong's *TREASURE* (1999) was originally a public art commission as part of Québec's Integration of Art and Architecture program, and currently sits in the foyer of a hospital located in Montréal's Chinatown. Wong intended for the installation to bring the atmosphere of a natural setting into the sterile interior space for the residents to enjoy. It consists of a four-panel mural depicting the sky bracketing a landscape drawing, while the Chinese character 宝 for "treasure"—rendered in glass—sits in a shallow basin of water below. *TREASURE II* (2025), a striking new iteration of the work, features a vivid blue sky and billowing clouds, which frame a black-and-white detail of the classical Chinese landscape painting *Buddhist Temples amid Autumn Mountains*.

Lauraine Mak

Levels

Brighouse Station, Canada Line

Levels is an ongoing series of works centering around the concept of measurement as a means to justify and understand phenomena. These photos capture an uncertain moment in time grounded by a tiny bubble of air at the center of a precision bubble level. The instrument negotiates a version of truth with the observer which is contingent on gravity, orientation, and precise reading, thus rendering an indisputable analytical truth. Is objective positionality unquestionable? Are instruments of measurement infallible? The inconspicuous bubble level is a powerful tool that symbolizes the logical order imposed on daily life and motion; a reminder that all things follow earthly physics in one way or another.

Tides Within

Fanny BokYin Tang & Debra Zhou

January 5 – March 24

Tides Within brings together Richmond-based artists Fanny BokYin Tang and Debra Zhou, whose practices share a deep desire to harmonize inner freedom with the rhythms of the natural world.

Tang's surreal seascapes reflect on environmental fragility and Buddhist teachings, blending playful marine life with symbolic coral forms. Zhou's abstract watercolour landscapes are rooted in her experience of pregnancy and early motherhood, evoking the resonance between the creation of life and the cosmos beyond. Using water as a central metaphor for connection and impermanence, both artists offer introspective visual languages shaped by the aesthetics of Chinese ink brush painting.

Born on the island of Nauru in the Central Pacific, Fanny BokYin Tang holds a BFA in oil painting from the University of Calgary and an MFA in fresco painting from the Central Academy of Fine Arts in Beijing. Debra Zhou is a Richmond-based artist whose creative journey began in Shanghai, where the blend of Eastern and Western influences shaped her artistic lens.

Flights of Serendipity

Mitchell Seeyu

January 6 – March 9

In *Flights of Serendipity*, Mitchell Seeyu invites viewers into a world where fleeting encounters with nature and culture are captured through the fluid washes of colour and soft tonal transitions, drawing on the expressive aesthetics of the Lingnan School of Chinese ink painting. Seeyu draws inspiration from memories of Hong Kong and everyday moments in Vancouver—migratory birds mid-song, playful goldfish beneath blossoms, lion dances in the snow during Lunar New Year. Rendered on xuan paper with nuanced brushwork and atmospheric layering, these scenes evoke a dreamlike harmony between spontaneity and intention, reflecting a life attuned to the serendipitous rhythms of nature.

Mitchell Seeyu is a Hong Kong-born, Vancouver-based artist whose work explores natural beauty and landscapes as metaphors for memory, history, and the passage of time.
