The title of this exhibition comes from a text, "Me in the Future," that Amy Ching-Yan Lam wrote at age eleven and put in a time capsule, speculating by the age of twenty-five she would be married, have a career, and "a small but comfy house and maybe a dog." Starting from these childhood fantasies of domestic love and financial stability, Lam presents artworks that explore how these dreams function within the wider context of colonial history. With humour and acuity, she examines the relationships between property, family, institutional power, collections, and theft.

A central part of the exhibition is a series of models created by Lam in collaboration with artist HaeAhn Woo Kwon; together they remake toys, domestic materials, and found objects into a fantasy communal home. The imagined dog is represented by the real story of *Looty*, a Pekingese dog taken from China by British troops at the end of the Second Opium War, told through a book and animation. And expanding on how collections are formed and accessed, Lam has worked with the Richmond Public Library to bring a selection of items from their Dr. Kwok-Chu Lee Collection into the gallery. In turn, Richmond Art Gallery participates in a lending program of artworks from their Collection, accessible through the Public Library, over the duration of Lam's exhibition.

The exhibition will be accompanied by an artist's book, co-published with UK-based publisher Book Works, in 2024.









Amy Ching-Yan Lam is an artist and writer. She makes exhibitions, performances, and public artworks. She was part of the duo Life of a Craphead from 2006 to 2020. Lam has presented work at Eastside Projects, Seoul MediaCity Biennale, the Western Front, Centre Clark, among numerous other venues, and has participated in residencies at the Macdowell and Delfina Foundations. Her first full-length collection of poetry, *Baby Book*, is forthcoming from Brick Books in April 2023. She was born in Hong Kong and lives in Toronto, which is Mississauga Anishinaabeg treaty territory.

HaeAhn Woo Kwon is an installation artist. Informed by vernacular architecture in the urban environment of South Korea, her practice recombines and transforms disparate objects and means of production, reflecting on the availability of excess goods and the necessity of inventiveness in our current moment. She often collaborates with Paul Kajander as Haeahn Paul Kwon Kajander. She is an Assistant Professor at NSCAD University and represented by Franz Kaka Gallery in Tkaronto. She lives in Kjipuktuk, known as Halifax.

Su-Ying Lee is an independent curator living in Toronto/ Tkaronto/Taranton/Gichi Kiiwenging, Canada. She has also worked in institutions as Assistant Curator at the Museum of Contemporary Canadian Art (MOCCA), Curator in Residence at the Justina M. Barnicke Gallery, and Assistant Curator at the Art Gallery of Mississauga. She received a Master's Degree in Curatorial Studies at the University of Toronto and is an alumnus of the Toronto Arts Council/ Banff Centre's Cultural Leaders' Lab. Her projects have taken place across Canada, in Hong Kong, Mexico City, and Quezon City (Metro Manila), Philippines where she co-curated the third Kamias Triennial (2020).


Jaspal Birdi 11h02m


Lansdowne Station

In 2020, Jaspal Birdi had been working on an art residency in Milan, Italy, when news of lockdowns began circulating. So she had to pursue her work in Toronto. Often working in both countries, Birdi is used to living in between places. The pandemic, however, put a twist on her otherwise mobile life.

11h02m was first shown in Birdi's 2020 exhibition, Can I Play Outside? In this work, Birdi draws us back to this time of isolation due to the pandemic, where she simultaneously felt a sense of helplessness and an elevated state of creativity, while struggling with feelings of confinement, longing, and hope. The sameness of looking at the sky every day gave Birdi a sense of separation from those she longed to be with. However, seeing the clouds move collectively also gave her a sense of being among a community and the hope that the world would move on from the crisis together.

This painterly image of a blue sky lined with low-lying clouds is actually a photograph taken using an iPhone, from Birdi's window at her Toronto home. More interested in the imperfect image than the faithful duplication of her shots, Birdi overrides the settings of her printer, which would typically cease printing when the toner runs out. She scanned and enlarged the print and re-printed it in pieces. She transferred the image onto a gold rescue blanket – a lightweight, portable material that is both delicate and stable. The result is this ethereal abstracted image offering a window into how the artist navigated a time of unprecedented collective uncertainty.





Faune Ybarra Iceberg Stranded in My Bed Aberdeen Station

Faced with her feelings of displacement and the constant need to adapt to different landscapes, diasporic artist Faune Ybarra aspires to ground herself in the places she chooses to live. Born and raised in Mexico, Ybarra moved to St. John's, Newfoundland, where she lived for four years. She now lives and works in Vancouver. Hoping to acknowledge her presence in a new-albeit potentially transient-place, Ybarra began creating an ongoing multimedia archive of her journeys to weave her story within the broader tapestry of immigrant narratives. This work is a part of Ybarra's archive.

While in St. John's, Ybarra developed an artistic response to Robert E. Holloway's book, *Through Newfoundland with the Camera* (1905). Now part of the Digital Archives Initiative, the seminal book influenced the Canadian's public's perception of the province in the early 1900s. Ybarra contemplates whether her perspective as an immigrant to Canada and as an artist of colour could provide nuance to the evolving history of the province.

In 2020, at the beginning of the pandemic, Ybarra, unable to get to the physical archives in St. John's, used its digital archive as a point of departure for *Iceberg Stranded in*

My Bed. Enshrouded in a white blanket, she stands on a mattress situated in her apartment in Vancouver. Projected on her is an image of the Holloway photograph "Iceberg Stranded Outside St. John's Harbour for Three Weeks." Ybarra's movement and the shape of her covered self change the original archival image's identity, creating a new one in the process, one of intimate connection, impermanence, and confinement.



OFF-SITE

CITY HALL GALLERIA

Located just across the street from the Richmond Art Gallery, City Hall Galleria is an off-site exhibition space. As part of its outreach to the local community, City Hall Galleria highlights artists primarily from Richmond and/or artworks with a close connection to Richmond in terms of themes and subject matter. City Hall Galleria does occasional calls and accepts submissions throughout the year.

JANETTE CALUBAD

January 17 – May 1

Journey is a series of five acrylic paintings that depicts the clouds of British Columbia using what Calubad describes as a "hyper-impressionistic" approach, in which she pays special attention to texture, movement, and light. Rendered with a seemingly flattened perspective, these paintings are nonetheless filled with layers that convey emotions and sentiments that Calubad restrains from expressing in her daily life. Treating her art practice as an escape from reality, Calubad hopes to transport herself and viewers to a semi-fantastical world through her landscape paintings.

Born and raised in the Philippines, Calubad graduated from the College of the Holy Spirit Manila with a degree in advertising in 1999. In addition to working in her primary medium of painting, Calubad enjoys sewing and crafting. As an entrepreneur, she channels her creativity into running her restaurant and art workshop business in the Philippines. Currently based in Richmond, Calubad recently immigrated to Canada to explore the career path of being an artist.

KAREN LEON

January 17 - May 1

Home is a series of three acrylic paintings that show-cases Leon's Ecuadorian background in tandem with nostalgic memories of her childhood in Richmond. Growing up in Canada, Leon did not see much representation of Ecuadorian—or Latin American—culture in general. She aims to make space for anyone who might recognize elements of their culture in her work. Inspired by everyday experiences, Home attempts to capture the essence of Leon's childhood neighbourhood before it is completely changed due to gentrification.

Originally from Ecuador, Leon grew up in Richmond and is now in her second year of the Fine Arts Diploma program at Langara College, where she works primarily with acrylic, ceramics, and serigraphy. In some of her other works, she focuses on portraying her Ecuadorian culture within domestic settings.









UPCOMING EXHIBITION

Amy-Claire Huestis MOTHLIKE/silvery-blue

June 24 – August 20

This exhibition is the culmination of years of research and activity along the foreshore of the Fraser River Delta by Ladner-based artist Amy-Claire Huestis. It celebrates our kinship with birds, the interconnectedness of all things, and the importance of ecological areas currently under threat due to human development.

In 2022, Huestis and a group of community collaborators led a site-specific procession/performance in the Key Biodiversity Area of Hwuli'tth'um (Brunswick Point in Ladner), an area of critical ecological importance for migratory birds within the Fraser River Estuary, in the ancestral and present-day lands of the Coast Salish Peoples.

At Richmond Art Gallery, the artist presents new art work and documentation from the original performance while also welcoming the public to participate in new actions at the gallery and along Richmond's foreshore.

Walk Quietly (t'ásxelem) Self-guided walk / walkquietly.ca

Organized by Amy-Claire Huestis

Richmond Art Gallery presents a unique off-site project entitled *Walk Quietly (t'ásxelem)*. Ladner-based artist Amy-Claire Huestis collaborated with a diverse group of ecologists, Hwlistsum elders and local residents to develop a self-guided walk of Brunswick Point, an integral ecosystem for migratory birds and a site of cultural significance for the Hwlitsum First Nation in Ladner, BC.

Huestis and her collaborators share ecological and cultural stories about this sensitive ecological area via signage with QR codes throughout Brunswick Point. The project celebrates our kinship with birds, the interconnectedness of all things, and the importance of a biodiverse area currently under ecological threat due to human development.

Direct and humorous, *Baby Book* stacks story upon story to explore how beliefs are first formed. From a discount bus tour family vacation to a cosmogony based on cheese, these poems accumulate around principles of contingency and revelation. Lam describes the vivid tactility of growth and death—how everything is constantly, painfully remade—offering a vision against the stuck narratives of property and inheritance. BC artist Toni Onley (b. 1928; d. 2004) is known for his elegantly spare abstract paintings and muted palette. While in the late 1950s he was influenced by the vigorous mark-making of Abstract Expressionism, by the 1960s, he was using a pared-down approach, creating what he called "archetypal" landscapes, devoid of geographic detail, reduced to simple configurations of colour and shape. Alongside a generation of west coast painters including Gordon Smith and Takao Tanabe, Onley is known for his unique contributions to the landscape genre—aptly described by Canadian curator David Burnett and art historian Marilyn Schiff as expressing "a sensibility of landscape rather than a description."
