

SONJA AHLERS Classification Crisis

September 9 – November 5

Curated by Godfre Leung

Since the early nineties, Victoria-based artist Sonja Ahlers has been making books in her distinct visual idiom that is equal parts collage and poetry. Best known for her books *Temper*, *Temper* (1998)—a compilation of her black-and-white, photocopied zines from the nineties—and *The Selves* (2010)—the precursor to her work with the influential teengirl magazine *Rookie*—Ahlers's work has been a touchstone for multiple generations of feminist culture. *Classification Crisis*, a retrospective survey of her three-decade career, highlights the compulsive collecting and organizing of images at the heart of Ahlers's work.

Classification Crisis also follows Ahlers's life, from her early career in Victoria, where from afar she participated in the Riot Grrrl network, producing some of that subculture's most legendary zines; to Vancouver after the turn of the millennium, where she spent an unhappy near-decade working in an uncomfortable grey zone between the city's artist-run centre and outsider alt-craft scenes; to a stint in Whitehorse, where she largely unplugged from the art

world and for a time worked at the Yukon Archives, while also serving as *Rookie's* visual mastermind; and back to Victoria to care for her ailing mother in their family home where she would ultimately become the custodian of her mother's belongings and affairs.

Alongside her care work duties in Victoria, Ahlers has spent the last half-decade tending to and preparing her own archive, a project that is ongoing. Revisiting and organizing the documents of her career also led Ahlers to produce a new bookwork, *Rabbit-Hole*, which she describes as a "feminist memoir/scrapbook/confessional commentary on the art world and my place within it." Adapted for the exhibition as an installation, *Rabbit-Hole* retells the story of her career as a mystery narrative. From the hindsight of the #MeToo reckoning, Ahlers thematizes the collecting and reassembling that sustains her art as a search for "clues" and "evidence" left behind by her former selves.

The exhibition also features Ahlers's nineties zines; her increasingly experimental and colourful books of the

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ensuing decade; the handmade angora Fierce Bunnies that first became an underground sensation in the early aughts; one-of-a-kind chapbooks spanning thirty years; a decade of unseen work after she "quit art" in the wake of the Vancouver art boom; and ephemera from a long career of collecting images and scraps of language.

The exhibition is accompanied by a major publication co-published with Conundrum Press, featuring a comprehensive survey of the artist's career by the curator; thematic texts by Tavi Gevinson, Kathleen Hanna, Doretta Lau, and Lisa Prentice—contemporaries of Ahlers from throughout her career—a methodological essay on Ahlers's archive by scholars Alexandra Alisauskas and Jennifer Douglas; and *Rabbit-Hole* in its original 160-page book form.



Biographies

Sonja Ahlers is a visual artist and poet based in Victoria, on the unceded territories of the lak waŋan (Lekwungen) speaking peoples, now known as the Songhees and Esquimalt Nations. Since the early nineties, Ahlers has worked primarily in book and book-adjacent formats, in a medium that she calls visual poetry. She is the author of *Temper, Temper* and *Fatal Distraction* (Insomniac Press, 1998 and 2004), *The Selves* (Drawn & Quarterly, 2010), and *Swan Song* (Conundrum Press, 2021), and was a key contributor to *Rookie Mag* from 2011 to 2015.

Godfre Leung is a critic and the curator at the Contemporary Art Gallery in Vancouver, the unceded territories of the xwməθkwəyəm, Skwxwi7mesh, and səlilwətał Nations. In the last few years, his writing has appeared in ArtAsiaPacific, ASAP/Journal, and C Magazine, and he has organized exhibitions by Pao Houa Her, Christopher K. Ho, Sesemiya, TJ Shin, and Soomaal House of Art.









Collecting and Reassembling

Artists from all over the world have contributed postcard-size artworks for the 2023 Mail Art Exhibition and Fundraiser. Organized in tandem with the exhibition *Sonja Ahlers: Classification Crisis*, this open call exhibition invited artists to mail in one original piece of artwork in response to the theme of "collecting and reassembling."

Also known as postal art and correspondence art, mail art is an artistic movement centered on sending and sharing small-scale works through the postal service. Based on the principles of equal, one-to-one collaboration between artists, mail art has become a worldwide cultural movement for artists to share visual art, poetry, or any other artistic form through the postal system.

Through the 2000s, Richmond Art Gallery hosted regular mail art and artist trading card exhibitions that over time have included thousands of artists from all over the world. Given Sonja Ahlers' engagement with mail art and mixed tape exchanges throughout her career, it seemed fitting to revive the Mail Art Exhibition at the Richmond Art Gallery, ten years after the last one in 2013.

To continue the democratic tradition of this art form, all mailed-in entries received by the gallery are featured in this exhibition. Once the exhibition in the Gallery closes, these artworks will be auctioned off to raise funds in support of our public programs.

We thank all the artists involved in this exhibition for their generosity in donating their artworks, and to all of those who will purchase their artworks. All funds will go towards the Gallery's future public programming.

Nikita Yingqian Cai has curated such exhibitions as Times Heterotopia Trilogy (2011, 2014, 2017), Jiang Zhi: If This is a Man (2012), Roman Ondák: Storyboard (2015), Big Tail Elephants: One Hour, No Room, Five Shows (2016), Pan Yuliang: A Journey to Silence (Villa Vassilieff in Paris and Guangdong Times Museum, 2017), Omer Fast: The Invisible Hand (2018), Neither Black/Red/Yellow Nor Woman (Times Art Center Berlin, 2019), Zhou Tao: The Ridge in the Bronze Mirror (2019), and Candice Lin: Pigs and Poison (2021). She runs the series and the research network of "All the Way South," and is the co-editor of On Our Times and the podcast host of Rolling Congee. She was awarded the Asian Cultural Council Fellowship in 2019.

PUBLIC ART ON THE CANADA LINE

Jaspal Birdi 11h02m

Lansdowne Station

Jaspal Birdi's 11h02m harks back to the early days of the pandemic, where she simultaneously felt a sense of helplessness and isolation, and an elevated state of creativity and hope. Photographed with her iPhone from a window in her Toronto home, 11h02 resembles a painting of a blue sky lined with low-lying clouds. More interested in the imperfect image than the faithful duplication of her shots, Birdi overrides the settings of her printer, which would typically cease printing when the toner runs out. She scanned and enlarged the print, then transferred the image onto a gold rescue blanket—a lightweight, portable material that is both delicate yet strong. The result is this ethereal abstracted work offering a window into how the artist navigated a time of unprecedented collective uncertainty.

Faune Ybarra Iceberg Stranded in My Bed

Aberdeen Station

Originally from Mexico, Faune Ybarra moved to St. John's, Newfoundland, where she lived for four years, and then to Vancouver. While in St. John's, Ybarra became interested in Robert E. Holloway's seminal book, *Through Newfoundland with the Camera* (1905), now part of the Digital Archives Initiative.

During the pandemic, Ybarra used this digital archive as a point of departure for *Iceberg Stranded in My Bed*. Enshrouded in a blanket, she stands on a mattress in her apartment in Vancouver. Projected onto her is an image of the Holloway photograph "Iceberg Stranded Outside St. John's Harbour for Three Weeks." Through this performative act, she changes the archival image's original identity, creating a new one in the process, one of intimate connection and confinement.




