# NOURISH

Mizzonk & Jane Wong

January 22 – April 3, 2022

Curated by Nan Capogna

Nourishment – its scope and significance – lies at the heart of the works of artist duo, Mizzonk (Wan-Yi Lin and Roger Chen), and Jane Wong. How we are nourished, often characterized in terms of deprivation or abundance, can rouse memories of deep emotional intensity. Wong, a Seattle-based poet and artist, draws upon her experience of growing up in a Chinese American restaurant in New Jersey, and her family's history of hunger and poverty in China. Artists Wan-Yi Lin and Roger Chen consider their secluded existence living and working on a remote acreage in Greater Vancouver. There is a life and practice that has provided sustenance and inspiration for the past twenty years.

Central to Wong's installation is the table poem, *After Preparing the Altar, The Ghosts Feast Feverishly*. Constructed as an oversized, round dining table – typical for Chinese restaurants – it holds numerous food bowls containing fragments of the poem written on their interiors. Viewers are obliged to walk around the table in order to read it. Food imagery - tender and visceral - features in many of Wong's poems. Fond childhood memories around the comforts of food are in stark contrast to her familial history. Wong's mother was born in China at the end of the Great Leap Forward (1958 -1962), the country's campaign to reshape its farming and industrialization policies.

Mizzonk's *Six Acres* is a projected animation produced from numerous watercolour drawings on paper. The slowly shifting compositions - pictorial recordings – developed from Lin and Chen's observations of living and absorbed within their rural environment. In 2001 the artists experienced the September 11 attacks on the World Trade Centre from the rooftop of their Brooklyn studio. The magnitude of the event propelled them to follow their intuitive impulse "to be with nature" and they moved outside the urban mainstream. *Six Acres* - with its creek, forest, grassland, and gardens - provided the nourishing and restorative environment to practice self-reflection and mindfulness, and to confront unresolved childhood memories. The artists' daily living revolves around the rhythms of nature, and they have adapted and prioritized their activities accordingly.

Through their works and personal histories, the artists present a range of realities: Wong highlights the impact of intergenerational trauma, food deprivation and waste, and the challenges faced by low-income immigrant families; Lin and Chen foreground the value of intuition and the beneficial influence of the natural world on mental health. Particularly within the context of a global pandemic, their works are reminders of our capacity to nourish ourselves and others.

In partnership with the City of Richmond's *#RichmondHasHeart* program we are offering an exciting community component that engages with the themes found in *NOURISH*. There will be drop-in and scheduled events, virtual and in-person. Inspired by Mizzonk's delicate animated projection, visitors can create their own small watercolour impressions, or write and share a poem after seeing Jane Wong's large poem table. Join us for artist talks, readings, conversations with chefs, workshops, and more. We are compiling a virtual cookbook and would love to include one of your favourite recipes. You can share a recipe by following a link on Gallery's website.

**Mizzonk** is the collective name of the artist duo Wan-Yi Lin and Roger Chen, all Taiwanese Canadians. Mizzonk studio has received several awards including the *Accent on Design Award*, a design industry award held in New York City, and the *TID Award of Space Installation Art* held in Taipei, Taiwan. Mizzonk's desktop works were carried by museum stores including the Winnipeg Art Gallery and the Museum of Arts and Design in NYC. Recent projects by Mizzonk include a one-year-long participatory art project in Maple Ridge, BC; the Outdoor Sculpture Exhibition in La Conner, WA; the TID Award Exhibition in Taipei, Taiwan; a solo installation at the Center on Contemporary Art in Seattle, WA; an ongoing billboard art project and a participatory public art project in Pingtung, Taiwan.

They are graduates of the Pratt Institute in Brooklyn, New York – Lin holds an MFA in visual arts and Chen received an BArch. They live and work in Greater Vancouver in British Columbia.

**Jane Wong** is the author of *How to Not Be Afraid of Everything* from Alice James Books (2021) and *Overpour* from Action Books. She holds an MFA in Poetry from the University of Iowa and a Ph.D. in English from the University of Washington and is an Associate Professor of Creative Writing at Western Washington University.

A Kundiman fellow, she is the recipient of a Pushcart Prize and fellowships and residencies from the U.S. Fulbright Program, Artist Trust, Harvard's Woodberry Poetry Room, 4Culture, the Fine Arts Work Center, Bread Loaf, Hedgebrook, Willapa Bay, the Jentel Foundation, SAFTA, Mineral School, the Barbara Deming Memorial Fund, and others.

The recipient of the *James W. Ray Distinguished Artist* award for Washington artists, her first solo art show *After Preparing the Altar, the Ghosts Feast Feverishly* was exhibited at the Frye Art Museum in 2019.

## **CHUN HUA CATHERINE DONG: THE MISFITS** Aberdeen Station

Utilizing digital techniques and photography, Chun Hua Catherine Dong's work illustrates the rich symbolic value of Chinese textiles to explore issues of gender and culture. The phoenix and dragon are interconnected symbols in Chinese culture and are often used together to symbolize auspicious and blissful relations between husband and wife. Within this diptych, Dong envisions the phoenix and the dragon not as opposites but as mirrors of each other. Adding her own twist to a traditional medium, the artist uses blue to return masculinity to the phoenix and plum blossoms to offer femininity to the dragon. By placing these symbols within the rainbowed sea and mountain patterns, the artist suggests a contemporary perspective on Chinese tradition.

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Each image is animated with augmented reality through a free app that can be downloaded on a mobile phone or tablet from App Store or Google Play. On site, open the app and point your phone toward the installation and hold until graphics appear.

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## **BRENDAN FERNANDES: THE LEFT SPACE** Lansdowne Station

Brendan Fernandes uses historically significant patterns to tell stories of power, camouflage, and resistance. Evoking a sense of urgency and emergency, "dazzle" patterns, which were painted on warships to confuse the enemy, are coupled with purple and magenta plaid, which at once symbolizes British colonial rule in Kenya, a warning to predators in the wild, and the flashing of police lights. Fernandes playfully wraps this symbolic print across Lansdowne Station. The gesture offers a moment to contemplate solidarity, resiliency, protection, and care during these trying times.

## **ERDEM TAŞDELEN: A MINARET FOR THE GENERAL'S WIFE**

April 22 - June 19, 2022

Curated by Julia Paoli and Toleen Touq

Presented in partnership with Mercer Union, a centre for contemporary art and SAVAC (South Asian Visual Arts Centre)

The starting point for Erdem Taşdelen's exhibition is a little-known architectural oddity located in the Lithuanian city of Kėdainiai, approximately 120 km from the capital Vilnius. Built in 1880 and restored in 2007, this structure is a freestanding Ottoman-style minaret that peculiarly has no mosque below or attached to it, and currently sits in Kėdainiai Town Park in a former manor garden. Seized from its original owners after the failed rebellion of 1863 against Russian rule, the manor was eventually handed over to a Russian Army General named Eduard Totleben, who constructed the 28-metre-tall minaret on the site.
